Game & Parks Commission Commits to Fund Lex Trail



Following a competitive process that attracted 14 Nebraska project applications, the **Nebraska Game and Parks Commission** (NGPC) in January announced it would grant funding for a Lexington Hike-Bike Trail for up to \$250,000. Three other projects also received notice of grant funding.

NGPC's **Recreational Trails Program** (RTP) is backed with funding from the **Federal Highway Administration** (FHWA).

The proposed trail would start where last year's Northwest Trail Project ended near 20th & Independence. It would



continue south, turn west just before the existing houses, then south again through The Optimist Recreation Complex until it connects with an existing east-west trail on the north side of 13th Street.

There is also a non-contiguous leg that starts at the west end of the 13th Street trail, going north along the east side of

Airport Road, and meets up with the Lexington Fieldhouse parking lot.

The project awaits a final go-ahead from FHWA, as well as several environmental clearances. City officials are hopeful these can be accomplished in time to complete the project in 2019.

Litter disposal

Updated Cemetery Policies



The Lexington City Council recently approved two documents that represent policies, rules and regulations applicable to our two cemeteries. (**Greenwood Cemetery** is north of Lexington on Taft Street; and **Evergreen Cemetery** is east of town on Highway 30).

The newly approved documents represent a modernization of language, most of which was decades old. The "Rules and Regulations" document rewrite is intended to improve clarity with more user friendly language. In addition to revamped definitions (e.g., the difference between "lot" and "space," other language is designed to ensure consistency and improve the City's ability to efficiently maintain the areas.

The new "Certificate of Interment Rights" is a brief agreement between the City and the purchaser.

Preparing for the 2020 Census

Every 10 years the nation takes a count of everyone living in the United States. This is what the Census Bureau calls the **Decennial Census**.

An accurate count is critically important for our community and state. Federal funds, grants and support to states, counties and communities are based on population totals and demographic factors. When residents respond to the Census, they help our community get its fair share of the more than \$675 billion per year in federal funds spent on schools, hospitals, roads, public works and other vital programs.

Businesses use census data to decide where to build factories, offices and stores, and this creates jobs. Local governments use the census for public safety and emergency preparedness. Residents use the census to support community initiatives involving legislation, quality-of-life and consumer advocacy.

The City is spearheading formation of a Complete Count Committee. CCC members will meet a few times until the actual Census, and will simply receive information they can spread to their communities to encourage people to complete their surveys. EnergyWise Tip: Lumen Depreciation

Valentine’s Day is just around the corner, and my sweetheart will ensure I endure six weeks of cold winter shoulder if I forget. But what if you’re strapped for cash after lavishly tending to your loved one’s Christmas wish list? Well, don’t worry. I have the perfect, potentially cost-free gift in mind that still communicates “You are the light of my life!” After all, how could offsetting the nasty effects of lumen depreciation in your sweetie’s world NOT brighten their day?!

What is lumen depreciation? It is simply the decrease in lighting output that occurs over the life of a light fixture or bulb. Gradually, without notice, illumination levels gradually dim. Before you know it, your significant other experiences eye strain and difficulty reading small print. As it continues, headaches and decreased productivity result. If left unremedied, poor lighting can even lead to accidents or depression.

Here’s where you become your love’s hero without emptying out your next-of-kin’s inheritance. First, know that some light loss factors are “recoverable.” These include lamp burnouts, lamp lumen depreciation, fixture (luminaire) dirt depreciation and room surface dirt depreciation.

Lamp Burnouts

When a lamp or bulb expires, it becomes a “burnout.” This

sounds fairly simple. But, if the entire light fixture has numerous lamps or if the fixture has a shade or translucent panel, globe, lens, etc., you may not have noticed the burnout. On behalf of your loved one, take time to investigate all your fixtures. And, if you come across a burnout? Well, simply replace it with a highly efficient LED lamp!

Lamp Lumen Depreciation

As lamps age, they produce less and less light on a predictable curve, the extent of which depends on the type of lamp. In the home, fluorescent lamps tend to be the worst. By the end of their life, output can drop lower than 80 % of their original rating. Don’t leave your Honey in the dark!



Replace old, dim lamps with new ones. If possible, use a permanent marker to write the installation date on the lamp or bulb’s base. This will help you determine whether you are getting the hours of life and anticipated light output you expect!

Fixture (Luminaire) Dirt Depreciation

Dirt and dust are inevitable, and particles are often attracted to and trapped in electrical equipment. Even if fixtures are cleaned every 18 months, dirt buildup can reduce light output by 10 percent between

cleanings. This is a simple fix. Get your cleaning rags, soap and water, glass cleaner, etc., and get to work. (Don’t forget to switch the light “off” first.) And, don’t forget about all those dead bugs lying in the bottom glass of your ceiling fixtures! Nothing says, “You’re my love bug!” like cleaning the dead ones out of your light fixtures.

Room Surface Dirt Depreciation

Since you already have the cleaning rags out for the step above, don’t stop there! Dust and other contaminants will build up on light-reflecting walls, floors, tables, countertops and other surfaces. These surfaces will become dirty over time and will not reflect light like they used to. Restore their reflective power by cleaning. Don’t be a dimwit this Valentine’s Day and blow through a bunch of money like Cupid at an archery sale! Compensate for your sweetie’s lumen depreciation by taking these simple steps. Both of you will be . . . (wait for it) . . . “enlightened!”

Lexington snow and ice removal

Winter is not over yet and the City would like to remind citizens of the following points related to snow removal. There is also an Emergency Snow Route map on the next page, and is also found on the Maps link at the City's website.

Property owners are required to remove snow and ice from sidewalks abutting their property, within 48 hours of the snowfall. Removal of snow and ice from sidewalks not only ensures safe passage for pedestrians (including school children), but also limits liability. Someone who sustains injuries from slipping on ice might claim their injuries resulted from property owner neglect.

Please remember that snow and ice removed from your property is not to be placed into the street. Instead move it to non-paved areas.

The City needs the cooperation of all citizens as we work to remove snow and ice from the streets. Citizens are encouraged to check

the City website or Facebook page, listen to local radio stations or read the local newspaper for announcements of possible Snow Emergency situations where substantial snowfall is experienced or anticipated.



In times of a declared Snow Emergency, parking along streets in the designated Snow Emergency Route is prohibited. Commercial Areas may also be included (see Snow Route map).

In addition, during a Snow Emergency, parking in the Downtown area is prohibited. In non-emergency times, citizens are still encouraged to move their parked vehicles off of the street in a reasonable period of time after snowfall to allow City crews access to remove the snow and ice. Information regarding the removal of snow in your area of the City can be obtained by contacting Tom Nelson at 308-324-5995.

The City of Lexington would like to reiterate that snow and ice removal is important for vehicular traffic as well as pedestrian traffic.

Please take the time to do your part to keep our streets and sidewalks safe. The City of Lexington thanks everyone for their cooperation and prompt attention to this issue.
