

Game & Parks Commission Commits to Fund Lex Trail



At its January 20, 2023, meeting, the **Nebraska Game and Parks Commission** approved grant awards for the **Recreational Trails Program** (RTP).

Lexington was one of four communities named to receive RTP funding. The other communities are Fort Calhoun, Wausa, and Randolph. Nineteen Nebraska communities competed for this grant.

Lexington was awarded \$250,000 to build a 10-foot-wide, 4,368-foot-long concrete trail in four segments to close gaps in existing trails.

Funding for the RTP comes from the **Federal Highway Administration** and is made possible by a portion of the federal motor fuel excise tax paid by users of off-road recreational vehicles.

The hike-bike trail segments will mostly close loops in and around the Optimist Recreation Complex. A fourth trail segment will cover the north side of Plum



Touted as the "Close the Loop Recreational Trail Project," the proposed project would actually close several loops and create several different-size loops for walkers and bikers to chose; the longest is 3.16 miles. The red lines show the proposed new lengths; the blue lines are existing (or soon-to-be-built) lengths (light blue was funded by the same NGPC grant and completed in 2021).

Creek Park along 13th Street. This segment has been planned for years, but was deferred until replacement of underground water mains and completion of a paved parking lot for the park.

There are several environmental clearances and

completion of a final design before construction will be approved by FHWA. It is anticipated these can be accomplished in 2023, and construction should begin no later than the spring of 2024.



Choose Earth-friendly landscaping

Did you know that herbicides and pesticides are harmful to our kids, pets, and the environment?

The chemicals in these materials pollute our waterways if washed from our lawns and gardens into storm drains or roadside ditches that lead directly to our lakes and rivers. Practicing Earth-friendly landscaping in your yard and garden can help protect kids, pets, and our waterways.

So what can you do? Simple:

- Select plants native to Nebraska. These plants require less fertilizer and water, and are more disease resistant.
- Avoid over-watering your lawn it needs about one inch of rain/water per week.
- Use mulch around trees and plants to help retain water, reduce weeds, and minimize the need for pesticides.
- Mow your lawn high 3 inches is the rule. Follow your community's leaf pick-up guidelines. Try mowing grass clippings and leaves into your lawn — they make good fertilizers.
- Use herbicides and pesticides sparingly and limit application to problem areas only.

EnergyWise Tip: Energy Monitors

Peter Drucker, known as an innovator of modern business management, is credited with saying: "If you cannot measure it, you cannot improve it." When making the most of the energy used in your home or business, simply

researching "energy efficiency improvements" often provides an approximate idea of how a project's energy savings compare to costs for improvement.

However, when opportunities are difficult to recognize, such as unexplained energy use or

calculating the amount of electricity produced by a solar panel array, an energy monitoring system is essential. In particular, those wanting to optimize their energy use need a system that specifically identifies where energy is used and how much is consumed over time, as well includes and the ability to verify energy savings.

For those unfamiliar with energy monitoring systems, most consist of hardware, software and the delivery of data to a smartphone, computer or other display device. Some systems allow additional components, such as smart plugs and thermostats, to be connected to provide automation of energy saving practices.

When choosing a system, consider the following factors



Appliance recognition - Unless

monitoring is performed on individual circuit breakers serving recognizable connections, the system must provide appliance recognition. Some do this through a process of machine learning by identifying the "signature" of an individual appliance's energy use and tracking it in real-time for further analysis.

Real-time cost tracking -Different systems will provide a variety of tracking reports

ranging from daily to yearly. However, owners especially appreciate seeing the energy use impacts of your appliances and devices in "real-time" and in terms of energy costs.

Smart devices - With the increasing popularity of "smart homes," controlling appliances and devices

through smart devices is crucial. When using smart device applications, users expect to be able to monitor real-time energy usage, adjust settings, set alarms and more. Systems without apps still provide useful information to help save energy

but don't provide the level of convenience many expect.

Solar energy capable - Many

people have or are considering solar energy (photovoltaic) installations for their home or business. Most often, these systems are integrated with utility connections so electricity can be used by the owner or flow back into the utility line. If the owner requires more

electricity than their solar panels are generating, the extra power flows from the utility line. While most solar energy systems monitor and record how much energy they produce, utility metering usually does not separately record how much is being used at the home or business versus being put back on the line. For that reason, an energy monitoring system is vital to understand the breakdown of energy production and consumption.

Installation - Many systems are designed so Do-It-Yourselfers can complete installation. While in the interests of safety, it is always better to have a licensed electrician appropriately handle the job, doing so is an additional cost for consideration.

Cost and savings - Basic energy monitoring systems intended for use in residential or small business installations range from \$70 to \$450. According to the Natural Resources Defense Council, the average owner identifies 10% energy savings after implementing new energy-saving projects. Some assertively pursuing efficiency optimization report savings as high as 20%.

Lexington snow and ice removal

Winter weather is upon us and the City would like to remind citizens of the following points related to snow removal. There is also an Emergency Snow Route map on the next page.

Property owners are required to remove snow and ice from sidewalks abutting their property, within 48 hours of the snowfall. Removal of snow and ice from sidewalks not only ensures safe passage for pedestrians (including school children), but also limits liability. Someone who sustains injuries from slipping on ice might claim their injuries resulted from property owner neglect. Please remember that snow and ice removed from your property is not to be placed into the street. Instead move it to nonpaved areas.

The City needs the cooperation of all citizens as we work to remove snow and ice from the streets. Citizens are encouraged to listen to local radio stations or read the local newspaper (including online) for announcements of possible Snow Emergency situations where substantial snowfall is experienced or anticipated.

In times of a declared Snow Emergency, parking along streets in the designated Snow Emergency Route is prohibited. Commercial Areas may also be included (see Snow Route map).

Citizens living along these routes are encouraged to comply with the prohibition and move their vehicles from the street. In addition, during a Snow Emergency, parking in the Downtown area is prohibited. In non-emergency times, citizens are still encouraged to move their parked vehicles off of the street in a reasonable period of time after snowfall to allow City crews access to remove the snow and ice. Information regarding the removal of snow in your area of the City can be obtained by contacting Tom Nelson at 308-324-5995.

The City of Lexington would like to reiterate that snow and ice removal is important for vehicular traffic as well as Pedestrian traffic.

Please take the time to do your part to keep our streets and sidewalks safe. The City of Lexington thanks everyone for their cooperation and prompt attention to this issue.






