The photo above shows only half of the Racquet Center; another two courts are mirrored in the other half.







Friday, February 7 12:00 p.m.

EnergyWise Tip: Mitigating Radon

As a Cornhusker, we love being top-ranked in the nation. However, there's top ranking we need to be very concerned about: As per the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA's) 2023 report, Nebraska ranks third in the country for radon prevalence, with about 59% of the more than 8,500 radon tests in the state exceeding the EPA's action level of 4.0 picocuries per liter (pCi/L). Nebraska's average radon level was 6.0 pCi/L. After smoking, radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States and is responsible for an estimated 21,000 deaths annually.

What is radon? It is an element and naturally occurring radioactive gas that forms when uranium, thorium, or radium breaks down in soil, rocks and water. Since the air pressure inside is usually lower than pressure in the soil around our homes, offices, schools and other buildings, it enters through cracks in floors, walls and construction joints, as well as through gaps around service pipes, electrical wires and sump pits. Your home traps radon inside, where it can build up. Radon levels are usually highest in the basement or crawl space. Levels tend to be higher in the winter than in the summer. They can also spike during heavy wind, rain, or snowy weather.

It's easy to your home's test radon levels. You can hire a professional tester or do it yourself with a kit you buy at a hardware store or online. Start by contacting the Nebraska Radon Program at (402) 471-0594 or visit www.dhhs.ne. gov/radon. Radon testing kits are also available from Two

Rivers Public Health Department, <u>https://</u> <u>www.trphd.ne.gov/</u> <u>programs-services/services/</u> <u>environmental-health/</u> <u>radon.html.</u> There is a small cost, and some residents may qualify for a kit at no charge.

If radon levels in your home are high, you can take steps to lower them. The most common and effective method is to have an active vent pipe system installed, which pulls radon from beneath the house and vents it to the outside. A small but efficient fan operates continuously to reduce radon levels 50 to 99%. Fortunately, Nebraska ranks fifth in the nation for lowest residential electric rates (12.13¢ per kilowatthour). That means the small fan costs less than \$3 per month to operate. It's a small price for safety and well-being!

If you have an active system, you should check on a regular basis to make sure the system is working correctly. Most active systems have a manometer,

which confirms proper operation. While fans may last for five years or more, manufacturer warranties tend not to exceed five years. At some point, they will require repair or replacement.

The EPA has designated January as National Radon Action Month, a time to raise awareness about radon and promote testing and mitigation. If you'd like more information about radon and what can be done to mitigate it, check out this EPA guidance, "A consumer's guide to Radon Reduction."

Curfews Designed to Prevent Crime



While considering solutions to youth vandalism and crime, one may turn to the City's long-standing curfew regulations. This may be helpful for parents trying to keep their children out of trouble. It is also recommended that, since police cannot be everywhere at once, citizens who witness youth out after curfew should notify law enforcement by calling 911.

City Code Section 22.80(c) reads, "Curfew for Juveniles. It shall be unlawful for any person fifteen (15) or less years of age to be or remain in or upon a public place within the city during the period beginning at 10:30 p.m. and ending at 5:00 a.m. on any day of the week, and it shall be unlawful for any person 16 or 17 years of age to be or remain in or upon a public place within the city during the period beginning at 12:00 midnight and ending at 5:00 a.m. on any day of the week.

There are exceptions to this, such as teens walking home following a school activity. To find our more, see the complete City Code at the <u>City website</u>. Under the "Public Records" button, open the "Lexington City Code" link and search for the word "curfew."




Lexington snow and ice removal

Winter weather is upon us and the City would like to remind citizens of the following points related to snow removal. There is also the Emergency Snow Route map on the next page.

Property owners are required to remove snow and ice from sidewalks abutting their property, within 48 hours of the snowfall. Removal of snow and ice from sidewalks not only ensures safe passage for pedestrians (including school children), but also limits liability. Someone who sustains injuries from slipping on ice might claim their injuries resulted from property owner neglect. Please remember that snow and ice removed from your property is not to be placed into the street. Instead move it to nonpaved areas.

The City needs the cooperation of all citizens as we work to remove snow and ice from the streets. Citizens are encouraged to listen to local radio stations or read the local newspaper (including online) for announcements of possible Snow Emergency situations where substantial snowfall is experienced or anticipated.



Citizens living along these routes are encouraged to comply with the prohibition and move their vehicles from the street. In addition, during a Snow Emergency, parking in the Downtown area is prohibited. In non-emergency times, citizens are still encouraged to move their parked vehicles off of the street in a reasonable period of time after snowfall to allow City crews access to remove the snow and ice. Information regarding the removal of snow in your area of the City can be obtained by contacting Tom Nelson at 308-324-5995.

The City of Lexington would like to reiterate that snow and ice removal is important for vehicular traffic as well as Pedestrian traffic.

Please take the time to do your part to keep our streets and sidewalks safe. The City of Lexington thanks everyone for their cooperation and prompt attention to this issue.


