ORDINANCE NO. 409

Introduction of Ordinance No. 409 of the City of Lexington , Nebraska.
And the matter now coming before the Mayor and Council was the passage and approval of
Ordinance No. 409 of the City of Lexington, Dawson County, Nebraska.
This ordinance was introduced by Councilman Hebrew , and is in words
and figures as follows, to-wit:

ORDINANCE NO. 409

AN ORDINANCE TO VACATE THE ALLEY RUNNING THROUGH BLOCK
NINETEEN OF MacCOLL & LEFLANG'S THIRD ADDITION TO THE CITY
OF LEXINGTON, DAWSON COUNTY, NEBRASKA.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF
LEXINGTON, NEBRASKA:

Section 1. That the alley running East and West through
Block Nineteen (19) of Mac Coll and Leflang's Third Addition
to the City of Lexington, Dawson County, Nebraska, is not
used for sewerage or water purposes and all of said Block
is owned by one person and that no damages will be sustained
by the citizens of the City of Lexington, Nebraska, if said
alley is vacated.

Section 2. That the alley running east and west through
Block Nineteen (19) of MacColl and Leflang's Third Addition
to the City of Lexington, Dawson County, Nebraska, be vacat-
ed and revert back to the owners entitled thereto.
