OVERNIGHT CAMPING ORDINANCE:

Ordinance No. 1950 entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO PERMIT TEMPORARY PARKING OF CAMPER TRAILERS IN CITY PARKS; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM" was read before the Council. Councilperson VerMaas stated that he had not received additional objections to this ordinance whereupon Councilperson Wightman moved that

Ordinance No. 1986 be passed on final reading, seconded by Anderson. Roll call. Voting "aye" were VerMaas, Weeder, Anderson, Wightman, and Hawks. Motion carried.

The passage and adoption of said Ordinance having been concurred by a majority of the Council, the President declared said Ordinance be adopted and signed the same. The Municipal Clerk attested to the passage and adoption of the Ordinance by affixing his signature and the Seal of the City of Lexington in declaring Ordinance No. 1950 to be published in pamphlet form.

# DAWSON AREA DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL REPORT:

DeEtta Hartman representing the DAD Council addressed the Lexington City Council with a report for a six month activities of this Council. Among the subjects of her report included business retention and recruitment. expansion of existing businesses. additionally she reported that the per capita and retail sales in the Dawson County Area have increased. That more manufacturing jobs are located in Dawson County and that our agricultural leads the State. She further explained that some of the projects worked on this past 6 months included the restructuring of Reach and various presentations to the Department of Economic Development for member cities. General activities included updating profiles for Cozad and Overton, inventory of available buildings in Dawson County, resource library for Dawson Area Chambers of Commerce, she also stated that she serves as a member of the Governor's Rural Development Commission and chairs the Community Development Task Force of that Commission. D.A.D. was instrumental in restructuring Cozad Development Corporation and revival of the Consolidation Committee throughout Dawson County.

Upon the completion of the discussion no further action was taken.

## ONE AND SIX YEAR ROAD PLAN REVIEW:

Mr. Dana Daniels representing Miller and Associates addressed the Lexington City Council defining the projects in the one year road plan which included the widening of U.S. Highway 283 from Ash Street to Washington. The installation of a box culvert or

bridge near the intersection of Nebraska By-Products and County Road. The paving and installation of storm sewer in Paulsen Subdivision on 18th Street and Plum Tree Road. The project of mudjacking the concrete to restore the crown on Monroe Street. The replacement of 450 foot of paving on Walnut Street. The study for a second grade separation over the Union Pacific Railroad Tracks. The frontage road south of McDonald's and the replacement of a wooden bridge over the City's drainage approximately 1/2 mile east of Taft Street. Pedestrian lights on 13th Street and Harrison and 13th Street and Tyler.

At this time Mayor Hawks stated that he had received a request from the planning commission to place a street from Adams to the stop light on south Bridge street in the plan. He also requested that the study of traffic lights or additional pedestrian crossings of the Morton School area be included on this list.

In the six year plan Mr. Daniels reviewed the south Jefferson Street paving, Walnut Street asphalt overlay, the Grant and 10th Street asphalt overlay, reconstruction of turning grades 5th and Jackson, 13th Street improvements, Maple and Spruce Street paving.

Being no further comments on this, City Manager Podraza stated that notices would be published and posted for a Public Hearing to be held at the Regular Council Meeting on the 25th of February.

No further action was taken.

VACATING CITY RIGHT-OF-WAY TO HIGHWAY 283: Ordinance No. 1951 entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO VACATE A PORTION OF FRONTAGE STREET RIGHT-OF-WAY; PROVIDE FOR REVERSION OF THE VACATED STREET TO ADJOINING PROPERTY OWNERS; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM" was read before the Council to be considered on second reading.

Councilperson Wightman inquired if there had been any objections to this Ordinance, without hearing none Councilperson Wightman moved that the

statutory rules requiring a reading of said Ordinance on three separate days be suspended, seconded by Anderson. Roll call. Voting aye were: VerMaas, Weeder, Anderson, Wightman, and Hawks. Motion carried.

Said Ordinance was then read by title, moved by Councilperson Anderson, seconded by Wightman that Ordinance No. 1951 be passed on final reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Weeder, VerMaas, Wightman, Anderson, and Hawks. Motion carried.

The passage and adoption of said Ordinance having been concurred by a majority of the Council, the President declared said Ordinance be adopted and signed the same. The Municipal Clerk attested to the passage and adoption of the Ordinance by affixing his signature and the Seal of the City of Lexington in declaring Ordinance No. 1951 to be published in pamphlet form.

#### **CALLING BONDS:**

City Manager Podraza informed the City Council that the City of Lexington would be calling \$235,000.00 dollars of bonds in replacing this debt with money from the Revolving Loan Fund for construction of the Disposal Plant.

Upon the completion of the discussion, Councilperson Wightman offered the following Resolution and moved its passage and adoption:

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 92-2**

BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Lexington, Nebraska:

Section 1. The following notes, in accordance with their option provisions are hereby called for payment on March 2, 1992, after which date interest on the notes will cease:

Combined Revenue Bond Anticipation Notes, 1990 Series, date of original issue - March 15, 1990, in the principal amount of Two Hundred Thirty-five Thousand Dollars (\$235,000), numbered as shown on the records of the Paying Agent and Registrar, in

denomination of \$5,000 or integral multiples thereof, becoming due and bearing interest as follows:

Amount of Interest

Maturing on Principal Rate to Maturity

March 15 of Year Maturing or Earlier Redemption

1993 \$235,000 6.20%

Said notes (hereinafter referred to as the "1990" Notes") are subject to redemption at any time on or after March 15, 1991, at par plus accrued interest to date set for redemption, and said interest is payable Said notes were authorized and semiannually. ordered issued by Ordinance No. 1884 which was passed and approved on the 13th day of February, 1990, and were issued for the purpose of providing interim financing for the cost of extending, enlarging, and improving the City's sewage disposal plant and system, waterworks plant and system and electrical light and power plant and distribution system pending the issuance of Combined Revenue Bonds. \$235,000 of 1990 Notes hereby called shall be selected from the current principal balance of said issue outstanding in the total principal balance of said issue outstanding in the total principal amount of \$500,000 by the Farmers State Bank & Trust Company in Lexington, Nebraska, by lot in such random method of selection as such Paying Agent and Registrar shall deem reasonable and appropriate.

Section 2. Said 1990 Notes in the principal amount of \$235,000 are to be paid off at the office of The Farmers State Bank & Trust Company, Lexington, Nebraska, Paying Agent and Registrar.

Section 3. A true copy of this resolution shall be filed immediately by the City Clerk with The Farmers State Bank & Trust Company, Lexington, Nebraska, Paying Agent and Registrar for the 1990 Notes. The Paying Agent and Registrar is hereby irrevocably instructed to mail notes to the registered owners of said called notes not less than fifteen days prior to the date fixed for redemption, all in accordance with Section 5 of the ordinance authorizing said called notes.

Councilmember Weeder seconded the motion for adoption of said resolution, and upon roll call vote the following voted AYE: Anderson, VerMaas, Weeder, Wightman, and Hawks.

The passage of said resolution having been consented to by more than a majority, the Mayor declared the resolution duly passed and adopted.

## GRAND GENERATION CENTER AGREEMENT:

Mr. Vance Bricker addressed the Lexington City Council presenting them with an agreement whereby the City of Lexington and the Lexington Meals on Wheels enter into this agreement for the purchasing and construction of the Lexington Grand Generation Center using Block Grant Funds and local donations.

Mr. Bricker went on to highlight the activities of the fund raising projects, and reviewed the estimated cost of construction for this building.

Councilperson Wightman moved that the Mayor be authorized to sign a Subrecipient Agreement with Lexington Meals on Wheels and the City of Lexington pertaining to the new Grand Generation Center, seconded by Anderson. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Weeder, VerMaas, Anderson, Wightman, and Hawks. Motion carried.

PAY ESTIMATE NO. 21 WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT: City Council reviewed Pay Estimate No. 21 from from Paulsen Building and Supply for construction at the Waste Water Treatment Plant additionally the verification letter accompanying it from Tom Satchell verified the amounts on the Pay Estimate.

Moved by Councilperson Wightman, seconded by VerMaas to approved Pay Estimate No. 21 from Paulsen Building and Supply for the Waste Water Treatment Plant improvements in the amount of \$46,715.12. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Anderson, Weeder, VerMaas, Wightman, and Hawks. Motion carried.

# ASSESSMENT DEFERRAL KENNETH BEANS PROPERTY:

The Lexington City Council reviewed the Resolution making the assessment on the Kenneth Beans property deferred until such time as any part of it is sold.

Moved by Councilperson Wightman, seconded by Weeder that the following Resolution be passed and approved. Roll call. Voting "aye" were VerMaas, Anderson, Weeder, Wightman, and Hawks. Motion carried.

#### **RESOLUTION NO. 92-3**

WHEREAS, the City of Lexington has, by Ordinance, assessed benefits in Water Extension District 90-1 against the following described property, to-wit:

A tract of land in the Southeast Quarter (SE 1/4) of the Southwest Quarter (SW 1/4) of Section Eight (8), Township Nine (9) North, Range Twenty-One (21), West of the 6th P.M. in the City of Lexington, Dawson County, Nebraska; and

WHEREAS, upon application of the owners, Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Beans, the City Council finds that said property is currently zoned and used for agricultural purposes.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEXINGTON, NEBRASKA, that pursuant to Nebraska Revised Statutes Section 19-2429 ff., payment of required assessments against the above described real estate from Water Extension District 90-1 are hereby deferred, effective as of the date of original assessment, such assessment to draw interest at the statutory rate of 6% during the time of deferral, and such deferment to terminate as provided by Nebraska Revised Statutes Section 19-2430, as the same may be amended from time to time.
