The Regular Meeting of the Lexington City Council was held Tuesday, October 10, 1995, at the Municipal Building, 406 East 7th Street, Lexington, Nebraska, at 7:30 P.M. Members of the City Council present were: Mayor Robert Hawks, John Wightman, Dorothy Anderson, and John Fagot. Councilperson Long was absent. City Officials present were: City Manager Bill Podraza, City Clerk Leon E. Malzahn and City Attorney Will Weinhold. Department Heads present were: Vance Bricker, Glenn Hawks and Kerry Rader. Also present were Scott Latter, John Redding, Chuck Mooberry and Len Bonczynski. The press was represented by the Clipper Herald, KRVN, Kearney Hub and Tri-City Tribune.

### ZONING ORDINANCE:

Prior to the consideration and reading of this ordinance, John Wightman and John Fagot stated that they had a conflict of interest and would not enter into the discussion or voting on this matter. This left the council with a deficient number of votes with Jerry Long absent. No further action was taken.

# SALE OF LIQUOR ORDINANCE:

Mr. John Redding addressed the Lexington City Council requesting the ordinance in the city code be changed to allow sale of liquor on Christmas and New Year's Eve when these holidays fall on a Sunday. Mr. tom Mooberry and Len Bonczynski's testimony to the council was along the same line as Mr. Redding's. Upon completion of their presentation and request, the council discussed their personal feelings of allowing alcohol other than beer to be sold on these days. Upon completion of the discussion, an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3-6 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE; TO PROVIDE FOR SALE OF LIQUOR ON NEW YEARS EVE WHEN THE SAME FALLS ON SUNDAY: TO REPEAL ORIGINAL SECTION 3-6, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES OR **ORDINANCES** SECTIONS OF IN CONFLICT HEREWITH: AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Fagot that said ordinance be passed on first reading. Hearing no second after an appropriate amount of time. Mayor Hawks declared the motion dead for lack of a second. After further discussion relating to the sale of liquor on Christmas Eve, moved by Wightman, seconded by Hawks to amend the ordinance to allow the sale of liquor and alcoholic beverages when December 31 falls on a Sunday removing the clause for December 25. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Voting "nay" was Anderson. Motion carried. Said ordinance was then read by title. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Hawks that this ordinance be passed on first reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Hawks, Wightman. Voting "nay" was: Anderson. Motion carried.

# PUBLIC HEARING WARDS SUBDIVISION:

The Lexington City Council held a public hearing to consider the request of Don Ward to change his zoning from A-2 Agriculture to R-1. Mr. Vance Bricker stated that this had been approved by the Planning Commission and is requesting the council rezone this property for the construction of residential homes. Hearing no objections to the rezoning, Mayor Hawks

declared the public hearing closed. An ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO REZONE WARD'S SUBDIVISION FROM A-2 AGRICULTURE TO R-1 SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL; to repeal all ordinances or sections of ordinances in conflict herewith; to provide for an effective date and for publication in pamphlet form." was read before the council. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Anderson that said ordinance be passed on first reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

#### SIGN ORDINANCE:

City Manager Podraza addressed the Lexington Council requesting an ordinance be passed which would prohibit the posting of notices on traffic control signs within the city limits of Lexington. Upon completion of the City Manager's request, an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE POSTING OF NOTICES OR ADVERTISING ON TRAFFIC CONTROL STRUCTURES IN THE CITY OF LEXINGTON. NEBRASKA: TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Anderson that the rules requiring the reading of said ordinance on three separate days be suspended. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried. Said ordinance was then read by title. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Fagot that said ordinance be passed on final reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Anderson, Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried. The passage and adoption of said ordinance having been concurred by a majority of the Council, the President declared said ordinance be adopted and signed the same. The Municipal Clerk attested to the passage and adoption of the ordinance by affixing his signature and the Seal of the City of Lexington in declaring Ordinance No. 2036 to be published in pamphlet form.

# CREATION OF PAVING DISTRICT:

City Manager Podraza informed the Lexington City Council that according to the subdivision agreement, streets in the Paulsen's Addition to the City of Lexington should have been paved at this time. This has not happened and therefore is polling the council to see if they would be in favor of creating a paving district in that part of town to hard surface these streets. Mayor Hawks informed City Manager Podraza to have the ordinance prepared for the next meeting and the council would take it under advisement at that time.

#### PARKING BAN:

City Manager Podraza stated that there are two parking stalls between the driveways of the public parking lot on the south side of the courthouse. These parking stalls are dangerous to ingress and egress from that parking lot. He stated that this ordinance would abandoned two parking stalls. He further stated that this ordinance would allow for controlled parking on the southwest corner of 7th and Grant making those parking stalls available to compact cars only. Upon completion of his request, an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 16-45 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE; TO RESTRICT PARKING BETWEEN THE COURT HOUSE DRIVEWAYS ON 7TH STREET, AND TO **PROVIDE** LIMITED FOR **PARKING** CONGESTED AREAS: TO REPEAL ORIGINAL SECTION 16-45, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH: AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Anderson that said ordinance be passed on first reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

# NAMING OF DEPOSITORIES:

City Manager Podraza informed the Lexington City Council that the Lexington State Bank and the Farmers State Bank have been previously named as depositories for city funds. Since that time, statutes have been changed and there has been addition of a new bank in Lexington and is requesting the ordinance allowing the City of Lexington to deposit in these financial institutions be passed. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Fagot that the following resolution be passed and approved. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Anderson, Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

## **RESOLUTION NO. 95-16**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEXINGTON. NEBRASKA as follows:

Section 1. That the Plum Creek Bank and Home Federal Savings & Loan Association of Lexington, Nebraska, are both designated as depositories of the funds of the City, and all checks, drafts, or other orders for payment of money may be endorsed for deposit by stamp or personal endorsement of any officer or employee and deposited in said account.

Section 2. That any 2 of the following: Mayor, Treasurer, Deputy Treasurer and City Manager be and hereby are authorized to draw checks, drafts or other orders for the payment of money on said account, and the bank is authorized to honor the same.

Section 3. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the power and authority granted in the Resolution shall continue in full force and effect until notice in writing is given to said banks of the cancellation or modification thereof.

### **RENTAL INSPECTION:**

City Manager Podraza informed the Council that he had been requested to bring the procedure of inspecting rentals before the Council to obtain their opinion of the procedure. The City Manager stated that if the council would be in favor of this type of a program he would call a meeting of city administration, housing authority, and rental owners to pursue the program. Mr. Podraza stated that the City would not inspect a rental property unless a request or complaint had been received to do so. Questions pertained to inspection of utilities including electric, water, and gas. Mr. Vance Bricker said that inspection would be according to Section 8 procedures.

#### CALL FOR BIDS:

City Manager Podraza requested the City Council allow City Administration to advertise for bids for a pickup truck to be used in the Street Department. He further stated that this truck would replace the 4-wheel drive unit used to push snow in the parking lots and difficult places for snow plows to reach. After a discussion pertaining to the specifications for this truck, Councilman Fagot requested that the specifications be listed in a poundage rather than just stating heavy duty. Upon completion of the discussion, moved by Wightman, seconded by Anderson to authorize City Administration to advertise for bids for a 4-wheel drive heavy duty pickup to be used by the Street Department. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.
