The Regular Meeting of the Lexington City Council was held Tuesday, October 24, 1995, at the Municipal Building, 406 East 7th Street, Lexington, Nebraska, at 7:30 P.M. Members of the City Council present were: Mayor Robert Hawks, John Wightman, Dorothy Anderson, Jerry Long and John Fagot. City Officials present were: City Manager Bill Podraza, City Clerk Leon E. Malzahn and City Attorney Will Weinhold. Department Heads present were: Charles Clark, Vance Bricker, and Kerry Rader. Also present were John Redding, DeEtta Hartman, Mel Uphoff, Tom Mooberry, Len Bonczynski, and Bob Blankenship representing Miller and Associates. The press was represented by the Clipper Herald, KRVN, Kearney Hub and Tri-City Tribune.

The proceedings hereafter shown were taken while the convened meeting was open to the attendance of the public. All items presented and discussed on the agenda were available for public inspection.
- **CALL TO ORDER**: The meeting was called to order by Mayor Hawks.
- MINUTES REGULAR MEETING 10/10/95: The minutes of the regular council meeting held October 10, 1995 were presented for Council's consideration and approval. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Anderson to approve the minutes of the regular meeting held October 10, 1995. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Long, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

Fund, \$114,767.73 from LEXUS Funds, \$9,538.25 from City Sanitation Fund, \$31,466.03 from the Landfill Fund, \$3,984.79 from the Health Fund, \$164.32 from CDBG 90-HD-010, and \$4,896.06 from Meals on Wheels to the City of Lexington Operating Account. SALE OF LIQUOR NEW YEARS & CHRISTMAS: The Lexington City Council considered an ordinance as amended for the sale of liquor when New Years falls on Sunday. Mr. John Redding and Tom Mooberry addressed the Lexington City Council individually requesting that they reconsider and allow the stores to remain open when Christmas falls on a Sunday also. After a discussion among the council, moved by Fagot, seconded by Long to amend the ordinance to allow the sale of liquor on Sunday when Christmas and New Years fall on those days. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Long, Fagot. Voting "nay" were: Hawks, Wightman, Anderson. Motion failed. An ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3-6 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE; TO PROVIDE FOR SALE OF LIQUOR ON NEW YEARS EVE WHEN THE SAME FALLS ON SUNDAY; TO REPEAL ORIGINAL SECTION 3-6, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES SECTIONS OR OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Fagot, seconded by Wightman that said ordinance be passed on second reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Long, Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Voting "nay" was Anderson. Motion carried.

UPHOFF REZONING: Prior to the discussion on this item. Councilmen Wightman and Fagot declared a conflict of interest and individually stated that they would not enter into the discussion and/or voting on this item. An ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO REZONE LOT TWO (2) OF UPHOFF SUBDIVISION OF A OF TRACT LAND IN THE FRACTIONAL SOUTHEAST QUARTER (SE1/4) OF SECTION TWENTY-ONE (21), TOWNSHIP NINE (9) NORTH, RANGE TWENTY-ONE (21), WEST OF THE 6TH P.M., DAWSON COUNTY, NEBRASKA, FROM A-1 AGRICULTURE TO C-3 HIGHWAY COMMERCIAL: TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT WEREWITH: TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECCTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PHAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Concerning this item, the council reviewed letters restating objections to the rezoning of this property. Upon conclusion of that review, Mayor Hawks inquired of Mr. Uphoff the reason for selling

his property. There being no reply from Mr. Uphoff and the conclusion of the discussion, Councilperson Anderson moved that the following ordinance be passed on second reading, seconded by Long. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Long, Anderson. Voting "nay" was: Hawks. Motion failed.

ORDINANCE RELATED An ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE POSTING OF NOTICES OR TO SIGNS: ADVERTISING TRAFFIC ON CONTROL STRUCTURES IN THE CITY OF LEXINGTON. NEBRASKA; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Anderson, seconded by Fagot that the rules requiring the reading of said ordinance on three separate days be suspended. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Long, Wightman, Fagot, Anderson, Hawks. Motion carried. Said ordinance was then read by title. Moved by seconded by Wightman that said Anderson, ordinance be passed on final reading. Roll call. "ave" were: Fagot, Long, Wightman, Votina Anderson, Hawks. Motion carried. The passage and adoption of said ordinance having been concurred by a majority of the Council, the President declared said ordinance be adopted and signed the same. The Municipal Clerk attested to the passage and adoption of the ordinance by affixing his signature and the Seal of the City of Lexington in declaring Ordinance No. 2036 to be published in pamphlet form.

WARDS REZONING: ordinance entitled. "AN ORDINANCE TO An REZONE WARD'S SUBDIVISION FROM A-2 TO SINGLE AGRICULTURE R-1 FAMILY RESIDENTIAL; to repeal all ordinances or sections of ordinances in conflict herewith; to provide for an effective date and for publication in pamphlet form." was read before the council. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Anderson that said ordinance be passed on second reading. Roll call. Voting "ave" were: Long, Fagot, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE RELATEDAn ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TOTO PARKING:AMEND SECTION 16-45 OF THE LEXINGTON CITYCODE; TO RESTRICT PARKING BETWEEN THE

COURT HOUSE DRIVEWAYS ON 7TH STREET. AND TO PROVIDE FOR LIMITED PARKING IN CONGESTED AREAS; TO REPEAL ORIGINAL SECTION 16-45, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH: AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Fagot that said ordinance be passed on second reading. Roll call. "ave" Votina were: Anderson, Long, Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

CDBG LOAN: Ms. DeEtta Hartman addressed the Lexington City Suzzette Council introducing Bob Strickland. Gaudreault. Tammy Hardesty who and have purchased Teresa's Tortillas Bakery and is requesting a loan from the revolving loan fund in the amount of \$15,000. Ms. Hartman stated that the bakery began operation in 1993 and at this time has 7 employees. With this loan, she expects four additional employees and increased sales When inquired about sales. Mr. Strickland stated that current sales started at approximately 4,000 per month this year and have increased to 7,000. The sales area includes North Platte, Lexington, and Kearney with hopes to expand to Grand Island, Scotts Bluff, and Omaha this year, and a nationwide market in the near future. Upon completion of the presentation for the loan request, moved by Wightman, seconded by Anderson to authorize the loan of \$15,000 to Teresa's Tortillas Bakery with the principals being Robert Strickland, Suzzette Gaudreault, Tammy Hardesty and Bobbette Sanchez. Roll call. Voting "ave" were: Fagot, Long, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Fagot that the mayor of Lexington be authorized to sign any and all documents pertaining to the loan to Teresa's Tortillas Bakery. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Anderson, Long, Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried. BIDS: City Manager Podraza requested authorization for the advertisement for bids for a pickup to replace the one at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Inquiries from the trucks should be a heavy duty. Upon completion of the questions and answer period, moved by Wightman, seconded by Fagot to authorize administration to advertise for bids for a new or used pickup at the Wastewater Treatment Plant. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Long, Anderson, Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

- PAY REQUEST: The Lexington City Council reviewed application No. 7 from Midlands Contracting, Inc. for construction of 13th Street Phase I improvements in the amount of \$385,564.70. Mr. Bob Blankenship addressed the Lexington City Council giving a guick review of the progress so far on 13th Street. Upon completion of his presentation, Mayor Wightman requested the retainage be raised from 5% to 7%. With no favorable comments to that arrangement, Mayor Wightman moved that application No. 7 from Inc. in the amount of Midlands Contracting, \$385,564.70 for construction of 13th Street Phase I improvements be approved, seconded by Anderson. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Long, Anderson, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.
- LOTTERY AGREEMENT: The Lexington City Council reviewed the lottery agreement which has been approved by the other communities in the county and would be forwarded to the county commissioners for their consideration at their next meeting. After reviewing the agreement, moved by Wightman, seconded by Long to authorize the execution of this agreement on behalf of the City of Lexington. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Anderson, Fagot, Long, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.
- MANAGEMENTThe Lexington City Council reviewed the
management agreement between the City of
Lexington and Lexington City Schools Dist. #1 for
construction and division of responsibilities of the
assets to be constructed by proceeds form bond sale.
After trying to deal with confusion concerning the
percentage of distribution of funds no further action
was taken.
- **TREASURERS REPORT:** Ms. Kerry Rader addressed the Lexington City Council presenting them with the treasurer's report for July, 1995. Upon review and scrutinization of the

report and questions answered by Ms. Rader, moved by Wightman, seconded by Long to accept the Treasurer's Report for July, 1995. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Anderson, Long, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

Additional discussion which followed the council meeting related to the write-off of bad debts which occurred during the audit period at which time the council was informed that a list of those were available for them to review at their convenience.

ADJOURNMENT: There being no further business to come before the Council, Mayor Robert Hawks declared the meeting adjourned.
