The meeting was called to order by Mayor Hawks.

CITIZENS COMMENTS:

Mr. Dale Nielsen, representing the Airport Authority. reported to the Lexington City Council that the Authority felt a need to work closer with the City Council and from time-to-time report upon their operations. He then went on to explain the operations of the Airport Authority stating that they had approximately four medical flights per week, two air ambulances per month and one to fifteen transits which would stop for gas. There are 25 airplanes based at the airport; 5 belong to Neben and 20 to private owners. He further stated there were approximately 3 jets per month that use the long runway. Projects for the next year include: paving the access road from the county road to the terminal building, build a maintenance building for equipment and building repairs. He completed his report by answering questions pertaining to the runways and stating that the concrete runway is 5,500 feet which is probably the longest runway for that type of airport. He further stated that he did not believe Lexington would become a regional airport since our closeness to Kearney. Regional airports at this time include: McCook, North Platte, and Kearney. He then reviewed the rates that individuals pay for leasing and operating their own hangers and/or leasing the airport's hanger.

15TH STREET PARKING

City Manager Bricker informed the Council that the Ordinance had been prepared upon the suggestion of the council at the last meeting which would prohibit parking from Adams to Park Streets on both sides of

15th Street. During the discussion, the Ordinance was modified to limit the parking from Adams to Lake Street only. Other items of discussion included a possible parking time limit on the north side. Mr. Larry representing Plum Creek Care Home. Allen, addressed the Lexington City Council stating that he would whole-heartedly support the ordinance for no parking on either side. Also supporting the ordinance was Kay Wiley. Upon conclusion of the discussion, an ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 16-45 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE: TO LIMIT PARKING ON 15TH STREET FROM LAKE STREET TO ADAMS STREET; TO REPEAL ORIGINAL SECTION 16-45, AND ALL OTHER ORDIANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Fagot, first by Klamm that said ordinance be passed on secodnd reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Wightman, Kohl, Klamm, Fagot, Hawks. Motion carried.

SANITATION RATES:

City Manager Bricker informed the Lexington City Council that this resolution would delete the section of the resolution passed that allowes sanitation rates to go up whenever tipping fees increased and the price of gas exceeded \$1.35 per gallon. Upon completion of this discussion, moved by Klamm, seconded by Wightman that the following resolution be passed and approved. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Kohl, Wightman, Klamm, Hawks. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION 97-05

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LEXINGTON, NEBRASKA AS FOLLOWS:

That pursuant to authority granted by Section 22-6 of the Lexington City Code, and in order to reflect changes in tipping procedures at the Lexington Area Landfill, the authorized charges and formulas for determination of charges for collection of refuse and garbage are hereby amended as follows:

- 1. Basic Residential service, consisting of either a 96 gallon roll-out container, 2-55 gallon barrels, or joint use of dumpster, for each residential unit: \$11.25 per month
- 2. Basic Residential charge for person 65 years of age or older and residing alone: \$9.25 per month

This rates adopted by this Resolution shall be effective for refuse collections beginning March 1, 1997. Original Resolution 92-16 is hereby repealed.

SWEEPER BIDS:

City Manager Bricker addressed the Lexington City Council stating that one of our current street sweepers has reached the age of approximately 20 years and needs to be traded for a new sweeper. Upon further discussion of the capabilities of the sweeper specified in the bids, moved by Wightman, seconded by Fagot that City Administration be allowed to advertise for bids for a street sweeper. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Kohl, Klamm, Fagot, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

LIQUOR LICENSE MANAGER:

The Lexington City Council considered the request of Lexington Co-op Oil dba Ampride to have the liquor license manager changed to Gail Hall. Mr. Hall was present and addressed the Council stating that he visits the station frequently during the day and is fully qualified to manage this liquor license. Hearing no further comments or recommendations, moved by Wightman, seconded by Kohl to recommend Gail Hall be accepted as manager for the Lexington Co-op Oil Liquor License. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Fagot, Klamm, Kohl, Wightman, Hawks. Motion carried.

LIQUOR LICENSE HEARING:

The Lexington City Council held a public hearing to consider the application of Central Tire and Tread dba Stoney's for a Class "B" liquor license at 2705 S Bridge St. Ernie and Rhonda Harris were there to inform the council that they had purchased this store

from the Stone brothers and would like to have the liquor license renewed in their name. Hearing no comments opposing this license, Mayor Hawks declared the public hearing closed. Moved by Fagot, seconded by Klamm to recommend the issuance of a license to Central Tire and Tread dba Stoney's for a Class "B" Liquor License at 2705 S. Plumcreek Parkway. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Wightman, Kohl, Klamm, Fagot, Hawks. Motion carried.

CONSTRUCTION PAY REQUEST:

The Lexington City Council considered a pay request from Associated Pool Builders for the pool mechanical contract. City Manager Bricker reviewed the pay request stating that this request for \$59,700 has been approved by Dave Burbach as matching the percentage of completion of the project. Upon completion of the presentation, moved by Klamm, seconded by Fagot that Application NO. 7 from Associated Pool Builders, Inc. in the amount of \$59,700 for construction of the pool mechanical contract be approved and the City Treasurer be authorized to transfer \$59,700 from the Aquatic Center Funds to the City of Lexington Operating Account. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Kohl, Wightman, Fagot, Klamm, Hawks. Motion carried.

CAMPER TRAILER PARKS:

City Manager Bricker informed the Council that there had been some requests for camper trailer stalls in the City of Lexington and the request had gone through the Planning Commission and is now at the stage whereby the council passes their judgement on this ordinance. The ordinance was discussed in detail by the City Council, the City Manager, the Attorney, especially with regard to the 30-day time limit. Upon completion of the discussion, no changes were made to the ordinance, an ordinance entitled. "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTIONS 25-6 AND 25-12 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE; TO MAKE PROVISION FOR REGULATION AND SPECIAL USE PERMITS FOR TRAILER CAMPGROUNDS: TO REPEAL ANY ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH: AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Klamm that said ordinance be passed on first reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Kohl, Klamm, Wightman, Hawks. Voting "nay" was: Fagot. Motion carried

MONITORING REPORT: Mr.

Mr. Bob Blankenship, representing Miller & Associates addressed the Lexington City Council with a map depicting the locations of the monitoring cages which were placed around the IBP plant to measure hydrogen sulfide. City Manager Bricker then discussed the details of the measuring process and stated that this would then be made available to the council.

COMMITTEE APPOINTMENT:

City Manager Bricker informed the Mayor that appointments needed to be made to the audit committee. With that suggestion. the Councilperson John Wightman appointed Councilperson Rick Klamm to the audit committee. The City Manager then informed them that there was a meeting of this audit committee to review the findings of the audit on Monday, March 17 at 7:00 a.m. Moved by Fagot, seconded by Kohl to confirm the Mayor's appointment of John Wightman and Rick Klamm to the audit committee. Roll call. Voting "ave" were: Klamm, Wightman, Kohl, Fagot, Hawks. Motion carried.

ADJOURNMENT:

There being no further business to come before the Council, Mayor Hawks declared the meeting adjourned.
