# CAMPER TRAILER PARKS AMENDMENT:

An ordinance entitled, "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTIONS 28-19.5 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE: TO PROVIDE FOR TRAILER PARKS AS A SPECIAL USE IN C-3 HIGHWAY COMMERCIAL DISTRICT: TO REPEAL ANY ORDINANCES OR OF ORDINANCES IN SECTIONS CONFLICT HEREWITH: PROVIDE AND TO FOR EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM." was read before the council. Upon reading of the ordinance, City Manager Bricker. stated that no comments had been received against or for this ordinance. Moved by Fagot, seconded by Kohl that ordinance NO2079 be passed on third reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were: Klamm, Kohl, Fagot, Wightman. Motion carried. The passage and adoption of said ordinance having been concurred by a majority of the Council, the President declared said ordinance be adopted and signed the same. The Municipal Clerk attested to the passage and adoption of the ordinance by affixing his signature and the Seal of the City of Lexington in declaring Ordinance No. 2079 to be published in pamphlet form.

**RESOLUTION NO. 97-09** 

CITY OF LEXINGTON
EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT ORGANIZATION
NAME CHANGE &
NAMING OF DIRECTOR

WHEREAS, the ninety-fourth session of the Nebraska Legislature enacted into law the Nebraska Emergency Management Act of 1996, which authorizes and directs that all elected officers of local government shall be responsible for ensuring that emergency management services are provided to their citizens and for coordinating emergency operations in their respective jurisdictions, and

WHEREAS, each local government shall be within the jurisdiction of and served by the Nebraska Emergency Management Agency and shall participate in a city, village, county or interjurisdictional organization, and

WHEREAS, such action is not only required by law, but that it appears in the best interest of the City of Lexington and of the citizens thereof to participate in the benefits and responsibilities of said act, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire and intent of the City Council of Lexington, Nebraska to recognize the name change from Civil Defense Agency to Emergency Management Agency, and

WHEREAS, the local organization shall be the primary organization serving the city of Lexington with the responsibilities of emergency management services, and

WHEREAS, the Dawson County Emergency Management Agency is supportive of the local organization with emergency management functions.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SAID CITY BOARD:

1. That there is hereby established within the city, a city organization for Emergency Management to be operated in conformity with the Nebraska Emergency Management Act of 1976, as amended.

This organization will be known as the Lexington Emergency Management Agency.

2. That the jurisdictional region of the Lexington Emergency Management Agency will parallel the boundaries of the Lexington Rural Fire District.

- 3. That, reposing great confidence in his integrity and ability, Joseph Pepplitsch whose business address is 406 East 6<sup>th</sup> Street, Lexington, Nebraska, is hereby appointed Director for the City of Lexington, Nebraska Emergency Management Agency, to serve during the pleasure of this City Board or until a successor is duly appointed.
- 4. That, reposing great confidence in his integrity and ability Richard L. Klauz whose business address is 709 N. Grant, Lexington, Nebraska, is hereby appointed Deputy Director of Emergency Management for said city organization to serve during the pleasure of this City Council or until a successor is duly appointed.
- 5. That the Lexington City Clerk will be responsible for the receipt and disbursement of all Emergency Management funds, where funds are provided for Emergency Management purposes.

### **AQUATIC CENTER:**

City Manager Bricker addressed the City Council stating that a change order for addition of sprinkler system for the Aquatic Center was before the Council with the deletion of sodding and the cost of the sprinkler made the change order approximately \$13,800.00. With no further comment, it was moved by Klamm, seconded by Kohl, that a change order to the Aquatic Center for the addition of a sprinkler system to be approved. Roll call voting "aye" were Fagot, Kohl, Klamm, Wightman. Motion carried.

## GRADE SEPARATION:

Mr. Dana Daniels, represented Miller and Associates, addressed the City Council. He in turn, introduced Mr. Bruce Grupe to the Lexington City Council, who gave a report on the steps needed to begin the process of acquiring a second overpass in Lexington. Mr. Grupe related to the Council the processes that Kearney had gone through with Union Pacific and the Department of Roads to obtain their second overpass. Upon the completion of his presentation, Mayor Wightman appointed Neil Kohl and John Fagot to a committee to meet with the Department of

Roads, Union Pacific Railroad and City Administration to discuss the possibility of a second grade separation in the City of Lexington. No further action was taken at this time.

**HYDROGEN-SULFIDE:** REPORT:

Mr. Dana Daniels, representing Miller and Associates, presented a report to the City Council regarding the results of Hydrogen-Sulfide testing in and around the IBP Processing Plant. Mr. Daniels reported that the patches used were normally used in a closed situation for a period of time and would not be a complete report of the presence of Hydrogen-Sulfide in the atmosphere. He further stated that other companies have used these patches, however, they were in a closed environment. Mr. Daniels went on to state that the City Staff will have a meeting with the Department of Environmental Quality regarding a sampling station that records more than just the presence of Hydrogen-Sulfide, in that it gives the particulate matter over a period of time. This would also include the direction of the wind, the temperature and the humidity in the air. He stated that this is needed to produce a valid report of these conditions. Upon the completion of his report, no further action was taken.

**GRANT APPLICATIONS:** Assistant City Manager, Joe Pepplitsch, addressed the Lexington City Council stating that he is requesting the City Council to give authority to apply for a planning grant to facilitate a comprehensive plan update in the City of Lexington, since our comprehensive plan has not been updated for a number of years. He feels this needs to be completed. He further stated that if the City of Lexington is the recipient of this grant, the grant would be substantial enough to hire a consulting firm that does planning within cities to formulate a comprehensive plan. Upon completion of his request, it was moved by Klamm, seconded by Kohl to allow city administration to apply for a planning grant to revise the existing comprehensive plan. Roll call voting "aye" were Fagot, Kohl, Klamm, Wightman. Motion carried.

After a review of the report, it was moved by Mandelko,, seconded by Fagot to accept the Treasurer's Report for the month of February. 1997. Roll Call voting "AYE" were Kohl, Klamm, Fagot, Mandelko, Wightman. Motion carried.

TREASURER REPORT:

Kerry Rader Lexington City Treasurer presented the Treasurer's report for February, 1997 to the Lexington City Council. After a review of the report, it was moved by Mandelko,, seconded by Fagot to accept the Treasurers Report for the month of February, 1997. Roll Call voting "AYE" were Kohl, Klamm, Fagot, Mandelko, Wightman. Motion carried.

ADJOURNMENT:

There being no further business to come before the Council, Mayor Wightman declared the meeting adjourned.
