AGING CONTRACT:

The Lexington City Council reviewed a contract from Central Nebraska Agency on Aging which funds Meals on Wheels for the Grand Generation Center and for those people that can not afford the full price of a dinner. Upon review of the contract, City Manager Bricker stated that this contract had been in

affect for a number of years and is nothing more than a renewal of an existing contract. Upon the completion of that statement, moved by Mandelko, seconded by Klamm, to authorize the Mayor to sign the contract with the Central Nebraska Agency on Aging for subsidized meals. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Fagot, Kohl, Klamm, Mandelko, Wightman.

WATER RATE: ANALYSIS:

Mr. Dana Daniels, representing Miller and Associates, addressed the Lexington City Council stating that an addendum needed to be made to their contract for the water study to include the analysis of rate, so the City of Lexington could have a fair and equitable return on their investment in the water department. Upon completion of his presentation, moved by Klamm, seconded by Kohl, that the contract with Miller and Associates is hereby amended, and that the Mayor be authorized to sign said contract including a analysis of the water rates charge for the use of water in the City of Lexington. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Mandelko, Fagot, Kohl, Klamm, Wightman.

PRICE'S SUBDIVISION:

The Lexington City Council reviewed the Subdivision Agreement for Price's Subdivision. At this time, Mr. Bruce Smith, representing Don Price, addressed the Lexington City Council, stating that they had redone the subdivision agreement stating that the pavement could be done in sections rather than all at one time. or as the houses are developed, and requesting the City to form a paving district to pay for this. At this time, Mr. John Knapple addressed the City Council stating that he could not understand why the rush on this project, why everybody was in a hurry to get this project through, as there seemed to be no hurry. He also questioned why a need for a paving district, and if the City of Lexington would be financing, would that not be a burden on the tax payers. He also questioned whether the easement for roads and utilities had been in place. He could not understand why he did not wait for the overpass study. Also addressing the City Council was Mr. Alan Easterday. who wanted to know which way the water was going to drain, if it was going to drain down past his house, because that's the only storm sewer in the round, and why all of a sudden, is the City of Lexington

considering creating a paving district. Getting back to the water problem, Assistant City Manager Joe Pepplitsch said that there would be no problem with it, that the water should drain to the west end of the subdivision and south to Dawson County drainage ditch. Mr. Easterday questioned how the water could drain south. Mr. Dana Daniels stated that the master plan, for drainage in the City of Lexington, the elevations indicate that water could drain south to the drainage ditch and then to Spring Creek. Easterday then guestioned whether the water off of the subdivision would cause excess flooding in the drainage ditch no. one, as he has seen that ditch run full after some rains. Upon completion of the citizens comment part of this item, moved by Mandelko, seconded by Kohl, to approve the subdivision agreement for Don Price. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Kohl, Mandelko, Wightman. Voting "nay" was Fagot. Council person Klamm abstained. Motion carried.

FINANCIAL REPORT:

A Financial Report for May, 1998, was presented to the City Council by Barb Mills who stated that expenses for this month had outpaced the revenues, only due to the fact that bond payments had come due, and this had escalated the expenses far above those of previous months. She also presented a comparison of the sales tax revenue for this year compared to the last three years with a statement that they have one year's worth of sales tax receipts in reserve for payment of the bond issue that the sales tax was obligated for. Upon completion of this study, moved by Mandelko, seconded by Klamm to approve the Financial Report for May, 1998. Roll call. Voting Mandelko. "ave" were Kohl, Fagot, Klamm, Wightman.

GRADE SEPARATION STUDY:

Mr. Dana Daniels, representing Miller and Associates gave his presentation to the Lexington City Council on the areas that were studied for the Grade Separation, which included the project goals and objectives, and the scope and schedule of things that were considered in the entire study. Upon the completion of the study, Mr. Tom Kellogg addressed the Lexington City Council relating a traffic study count that was performed by his firm, and incorporated into the Grade Separation Study, for the City of Lexington.

Upon the completion of that report, Mr. Bruce Gruppe addressed the Council reviewing four possible locations for the new overpass. One being Washington Street, the next being Madison Street, and then reviewing the West Adams Street, and finally reviewing the Adams Street Crossing. Gruppe reviewed these projects one at a time, not only in location, but incorporating the Traffic Count Study and the cost of placement of the overpass at each of these locations. Upon the completion of his presentation, and a discussion period on other items relating to the overpass, such as a collectors street from the North entrance of IBP to Adams Street to help disperse the traffic, and other improvements as may be needed, plus the financing of this project. Moved by Fagot, seconded by Klamm, that the following resolution be passed and approved. Roll Voting "aye" were Mandelko, Kohl, Klamm, Fagot, Wightman. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 98-06

WHEREAS, a grade separation study has been completed, determining that public safety will be improved by construction of an additional overpass over the Union Pacific Railroad tracks within the City; and,

WHEREAS, the Lexington City Council agrees with the study recommendation that an overpass be located at the Adams Street crossing of the Union Pacific Railroad.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED by the mayor and council of the City of Lexington, Nebraska as follows:

- 1. That the grade separation study is hereby approved, including the recommendation for construction of an overpass at the Adams Street intersection with the Union Pacific Railroad;
- 2. That the Union Pacific Railroad Company and the State of Nebraska Department of Roads is hereby notified of such finding, and is requested to determine the necessity for construction of such overpass and determine the priority for funding of such construction.

Passed and approved this 23rd day of June, 1998.

Moved by Kohl, seconded by Mandelko, to recess the Regular Session to Executive Session at 9:22 p.m. for the purpose of discussing negotiations with Union Pacific Rail Road on the Grade Separation. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Klamm, Fagot, Mandelko, Kohl, Wightman. Motion carried.

Moved by Klamm, seconded by Mandelko, to reconvene the Regular Session from Executive Session at 10:35 p.m. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Fagot, Kohl, Mandelko, Klamm, Wightman. Motion carried.

GENERAL DISCUSSION: Mr. Vance Bricker informed the City Council that the City of Lexington will be purchasing the service of DWN Incorporated for a Radar Screen to be installed in the City Building. That in the event of tornadic conditions such as existed twice this year, the Employees of the City of Lexington would be able to identify this action by the radar screen. Other points of interest, the City Clerk informed the City Council that his anniversary date had passed on June 16th.

which is the normal time for the City Council to evaluate the performance of the City Clerk.

ADJOURNMENT:

There being no further business to come before the Council, Mayor Wightman declared the meeting adjourned.
