CITIZENS COMMENTS:

At this time, Mr. David Selk addressed the Lexington City Council regarding his concerns about a van that was operating out of an alley, selling T-Shirts. The alley was blocked, and access through the alley was not available. He stated that he has talked with Assistant City Manager Pepplitsch, and the Police Department. Mr. Pepplitsch informed the City Council that he has spoken to Police Chief Clark regarding this, and he was notified that it will be looked at on a complaint basis. Following further discussion, no action was taken.

Mr. David Selk then addressed the City Council about his opposition to what IBP has done to the City of Lexington. He stated that Drive-by shootings, and drug busts have increased since IBP arrived, and many people are moving away. Council Person Wightman informed Mr. Selk that the issues he has mentioned, are far beyond what the City Council can address. Following further discussion, no action was taken.

GRAFFITI ORDINANCE:

City Manager Vance Bricker addressed the Lexington City Council stating that there are two Ordinances being presented to the Council. One is the original one that had been previously considered, and the other one would be attached to the Nuisance Ordinance. Mayor Fagot stated that Cyndi Smith, from Keep Lexington Beautiful, met with him following the last Council Meeting. Following their discussion, it was determined that the Court System, and the Police Department, would handle the criminal aspect of defacing public and private property, and the City's responsibility would be to see that the defaced property would be cleaned up. Upon completion of this discussion, and comparison of the two different Ordinances, an Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 18-1 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE; TO PROVIDE FOR REMOVAL OF GRAFFITI AS A NUISANCE; TO REPAL ORIGINAL SECTION 18-1, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM' was read before the Council. Moved by Wightman, seconded by Kohl, that Ordinance No. be passed on first reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Klamm, Cook, Kohl, Wightman, Fagot. Motion carried.

SUNDAY LIQUOR SALES:

Rev. Todd Karges, representing the Lexington Ministerial Association addressed the City Council expressing his opposition to having Sunday Liquor Sales. Rev. Karges stated that he knows about the families that are destroyed, and how much physical abuse happens as a result of alcohol. He wants the Council to be aware of how many people will miss work on Monday morning, and how many people are going to be killed on our roads because of drinking and driving. He added that children are home on Sundays, and would be more accessible, or at risk, to alcohol on that day. Also speaking in opposition to Sunday Liquor Sales were Nola Reed, Elaine Holiday, and Brocken Sheldon. Those speaking on behalf of Sunday Liquor Sales were Tom Mooberry and John Redding. Mr. Mooberry stated that he doesn't believe that they should shut out the whole society for a few problems. He further stated that liquor is a legal product, and highly regulated. Mr. Redding stated that he has had many people request Sunday Liquor Sales. Upon conclusion of further discussion, an Ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 3-6 OF THE LEXINGTON CITY CODE; TO PROVIDE FOR SUNDAY SALES OF ALCOHOLIC LIQUOR FOR CONSUMPTION OFF THE PREMISES; TO REPEAL ORIGINAL SECTION 6-3, AND ALL OTHER ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM" was read before the Council. Moved by Klamm, seconded by Cook, that this Ordinance be passed on Second Reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Kohl, Cook, Klamm, Fagot. Voting "nay" was Wightman. Motion carried.

CONTRACT FOR ENGINEERING SERVICES:

City Manager Vance Bricker addressed the Lexington City

Council requesting approval of the Contract between the City of Lexington, and Miller and Associates for Engineering Services. Mr. Bricker stated that he feels that the increases requested to service the City of Lexington are fair and reasonable, and meet the standards of the Engineering Community. Moved by Kohl, seconded by Wightman to enter into the contract between the City of Lexington, and Miller and Associates. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Klamm, Cook, Kohl, Wightman, Fagot. Motion carried.

SOUTH WATER SYSTEM IMPROVEMENTS:

Mr. Dana Daniels representing Miller and Associates,

made a presentation to the Lexington City Council on three possible options for the South Water System Improvements. After reviewing the current water system, Mr. Daniels explained in detail, the three options. Following Mr. Daniels presentation, and further discussion, Assistant City Manager Pepplitsch addressed the Lexington City Council, stating that after Staff and Engineers' evaluation, he would like to recommend approval to proceed with further planning on Option 3. Motion by Klamm, seconded by Wightman, to authorize administration to proceed with development of wells 17 and 18 for the South Water System. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Kohl, Cook, Wightman, Klamm, Fagot. Motion carried.

EXECUTIVE SESSION:

Moved by Wightman, seconded by Klamm, to recess the Regular Session to Executive Session at 9:03 p.m. for the purpose of discussing Personnel and Purchase of Real Estate. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Kohl, Cook, Klamm, Wightman, Fagot. Motion carried.

Moved by Wightman, seconded by Klamm, to reconvene the Regular Session from Executive Session at 9:19 p.m. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Cook, Kohl, Klamm, Wightman, Fagot. Motion carried.
