The Lexington City Council held a public hearing to consider an agreement between the City of Lexington and Dawson County for

911 FEE:

Enhanced 911 Service charge to be increased by 50 cents, to \$1.00 per phone, per month. City Manager Bricker stated that in order to make the 911 equipment Y2K compatible, additional equipment and software would need to be purchased, and this would require an additional 50 cents. per phone, per month, to support this change. Hearing no further comments, Mayor Fagot declared the public hearing closed. Moved by Klamm, seconded by Wightman, that the City of Lexington enter into an Agreement with Dawson County for Enhanced 911 Service Charges to be increased by 50 cents, to \$1.00 per month. ## City Manager Bricker informed the Council that the

Museum of Military Vehicles had requested the Army National Guard Tank at the Water Tower park, be moved to their location south of town. They said that they did not have a sherman tank and that they would like to have this tank. He further informed the Council that the Tree Board would then be planting flowers and trees at that location after the tank has been moved.
