FINAL DESIGN AGREEMENT:	City Manager Pepplitsch informed the City Council that the preliminary phases of the viaduct project has been passed. The next step would be to move into the final design. Mr. Stan Johnson, representing Miller and Associates, addressed the Lexington City Council, briefly going over the viaduct project, as well as the Amendment to the Engineering Agreement.
