Following Mrs. Hartman's presentation, Mr. And Mrs. Veatch addressed Council reporting their plans for the Building, and their Business. Mayor Cook closed the Public Hearing. Moved by Fagot, seconded by Miller, to approve the application from Veatch Home and Hardware, Inc. to the CDBG Economic Development Re-use Fund, in the amount of \$74,500.00. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Tomasek, Bennett, Miller, Fagot, Cook. Motion carried.

Moved by Fagot, seconded by Miller, to authorize the Mayor to sign all appropriate documents regarding Veatch Home and Hardware, Inc. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Bennett, Tomasek, Miller, Fagot, Cook. Motion carried.

PUBLIC HEARING: Mayor Cook opened the Public Hearing. Derrick Mitchell, representing Rodriguez Restaurante, Inc., dba Premier Night Club, requested Council's recommendation to approve a Class "M" Liquor License Application. Following Mr. Mitchell's presentation, Police Chief Charles Clark presented a report of various violations that had occurred at Premier Night Club. Mayor Cook closed the Public Hearing. Moved by Fagot, seconded by Tomasek, to recommend denial of a Class "M" Liquor License Application, for Rodriguez Restaurante Inc., dba Premier Night Club, located at 501 Plum Creek Parkway, Lexington, NE 68850, for the following reasons: Liquor License Application has been found to be incomplete and inaccurate; there have been fourteen (14) incidents at Premier Night Club. eight (8) of which were not reported to the local Police, which included first degree assaults, second degree assaults, and open containers violations. Roll call. Voting "ave" were Bennett, Miller, Tomasek, Fagot, Cook. Motion carried.

RESIDENTIAL SANITATION Marilyn Sabin, representing Dan's Sanitation, requested Council's approval of a Resolution to establish new Residential Sanitation Rates for the City of Lexington. Following discussion, moved by Fagot, seconded by Miller, to approve Resolution No. 04-25 to establish the charges and fees for collection of refuse and garbage. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Tomasek, Bennett, Miller, Fagot, Cook.

RESOLUTION NO. 04-25

WHEREAS, Section 22-7 of the Lexington City Code authorizes the City Council to establish by resolution the charges and fees for collection of refuse and garbage, and;

WHEREAS, an increase in operating expenses justifies an increase in existing rates.

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED, that effective January 1, 2005, the charge to be collected for residential garbage pickup within the City of Lexington shall be \$12.45 per month, plus an administrative charge of \$0.50, for a total of \$12.95 per month.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that effective January 1, 2005, the charge for residential customers who are single and 65 years of age or older shall be \$9.75, plus administrative charge of \$0.50, for a total of \$10.95 per month.

PARKS AND TRAILS: Chamber of Commerce Director, Vicki Gilpin, requested Council's approval of a Resolution establishing a Parks and Trails Steering Committee which would help research, develop and report to the Council a plan to help meet the goals for developing additional parks and trails in Lexington. Mrs. Gilpin reported that a Representative from the National Parks Service was obtained to help to facilitate this one-year planning project. Councilman Fagot had questions regarding the reasons for the establishment of this committee, if the committee would be reporting to the Community Development Advisory Board, if the committee would abide by the open meeting laws, whether the focus would be on all green space including existing parks, funding for the facilitator, costs that will be incurred for engineering following or during the study, and non-residents of Lexington serving on the committee. Gilpin and Cook assured Fagot that the process would be open to the public. Fagot asked if they were sure engineering would not be needed for any plan. Miller and Cook assured him that there would not be engineering needed in the initial stages and that the committee was capable of dealing with the matter should it become an issue. Pepplitsch requested his name be replaced with "City Manager" as the project is scheduled to take a year and he might not be here the entire time. Following further discussion, moved by Tomasek, seconded by Miller, to amend the proposed Resolution by removing the word "design", replace the name "Joe Pepplitsch" with "City Manager", that the City Manager shall serve as an ex-officio member, and that the Committee abide by the Nebraska State Open Meeting Laws. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Fagot, Bennett, Miller, Tomasek, Cook. Motion carried.

RESOLUTION NO. 04-27

A RESOLUTION TO ESTABLISH A PARKS AND TRAILS STEERING COMMITTEE.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITYOF LEXINGTON, NEBRASKA AS FOLLOWS:

That a Parks and Trails Steering Committee, is hereby created, the purpose of which shall be to research, develop and report to the Lexington City Council a plan to meet the goals for developing additional parks and trails as set forth in the Comprehensive Plan. The plan would be due one year from today and contain recommendations for site, size, configuration, and how the plan is to be implemented and paid for. The Parks and Trails Committee is to consist of Chamber of Commerce Executive Director Vicki Gilpin, Chamber of Commerce Tourism Committee Chair Max McFarland, an additional Chamber of Commerce member, two Planning Commission members, Council for Economic Development members Bob Heinz and Dave Fairbanks, Lexington Community Foundation members Wes Lubberstedt and Bill Orthman, Lexington City Council Persons Linda Miller and Joni Bennett, and such at-large members as the committee will appoint. The Lexington City Manager shall serve as an ex-officio member. The committee will be co-chaired by one city council member and one Chamber of Commerce member, and shall abide by Nebraska State Open Meeting Laws. The committee may establish subcommittees consisting of its own members and individuals not on the committee. The council agrees it will accept or reject the recommendations within 45 days of the delivery of the recommendations.
