Pepplitsch reviewed the proposed subdivision agreement. Following discussion, Resolution No. 08-19 was read. Moved by Salem, seconded by Miller, to approve Resolution No. 08-19 as presented. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Tomasek, Miller, Salem, Fagot. Motion carried.

An ordinance entitled "AN ORDINANCE TO REZONE LOTS 1 AND 2, NELSON SUBDIVISION, FROM A-1 AGRICULTURAL TO R-1 SINGLE FAMILY RESIDENTIAL DISTRICT; TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES OR SECTIONS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; TO PROVIDE FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE AND FOR PUBLICATION IN PAMPHLET FORM" was read by title. Moved by Tomasek, seconded by Salem, to approve Ordinance on first reading. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Miller, Salem, Tomasek, Fagot. Motion carried.

PRICE'S THIRD ADDITION:	Dana Petersen presented a rezoning request and subdivision plat on behalf of Don E Price for Price's Third Addition. Petersen gave an overview of the plans for Price's Third Addition and noted the intent to apply for a special use permit in the future for mobile home park use.	
	Mayor Fagot opened the public hearing for the rezoning request from R-1 Single Family Residential to R-4 Mobile Home District.	
	John Knapple, spoke in opposition of granting the request due to various concerns, including: paving, drainage, traffic, lack of park space, child safety, and congestion hazards.	
	Sharon Anderson, spoke in opposition of the change in zoning for the area. She reiterated Knapple's concerns, and thought existing trash and noise in the area would only increase. She felt there is no further need for mobile homes in the area.	
	Pam Knapple reiterated previous concerns, as well as impact on the local elementary school by adding 20 households to the area. She requested the application be postponed for further review.	
	Miller questioned the ratio of green space required for a mobile home park. Burnside noted that the city code calls for 300 square feet per unit and should be free of any traffic hazards. The public hearing was closed.	
	Pepplitsch reviewed the proposed subdivision agreement for Price's Third Addition. Items discussed were paving, area drainage, and utility easements. Weinhold noted that there is some confusion as to whether this is proposed to be a new mobile home park or an extension of the existing park no longer owned by Price.	
	Following further Council discussion, moved by Tomasek, seconded by Miller, to table the subdivision and rezoning applications to the November 25, 2008 meeting so that staff and Mr. Price can clarify certain issues. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Salem, Miller, Tomasek, Fagot. Motion carried.	
PAY REQUEST:	Pepplitsch presented Pay Request #6 from Cement Products Inc for the Pedestrian/Bike Trail in the amount of \$150,465.11. Following a brief update of the project, moved by Salem, seconded by Miller, to approve the pay request as presented. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Tomasek, Miller, Salem, Fagot. Motion carried.	
RESOLUTION:	Barb Mills presented an Identity Theft Prevention program as mandated, noting that many of the policies and procedures are already in place within the City. Following her presentation, Resolution No. 08-20 was read. Moved by Miller, seconded by Salem, to approve Resolution 08-20 as presented. Roll call. Voting "aye" were Tomasek, Salem, Miller, Fagot. Motion carried.

	A RESOLUTION ADOPTING AN IDENTITY THEFT PREVENTION PROGRAM AS REQUIRED BY THE FAIR AND ACCURATE CREDIT TRANSACTION ACT OF 2003.	
	WHEREAS, Public Law 108-159 went into effect on December 4, 2003 and amends the Fair Credit Reporting Act; and	

WHEREAS, such amendment, known as the FACT Act, requires creditors, including utilities, to comply with the Act no later than November 1, 2008; and

WHEREAS, the City of Lexington is, as defined under 15 U.S.C. Section 1681a(r)(5), a creditor that maintains and offers accounts for which there is a reasonably foreseeable risk of identity theft; and

WHEREAS, compliance with the Act requires a creditor to create and implement a written Identity Theft Prevention Program; and

WHEREAS, that said Identity Theft Prevention Program is appropriate to the size and complexity of the City of Lexington and the scope of its activities, that the Program is reasonably calculated to identify and detect relevant Red Flags indicating a potential risk of identity theft, and that the Program includes appropriate responses to such Red Flags that will mitigate and prevent identity theft.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and Council of the City of Lexington, Nebraska, that the attached City of Lexington Identity Theft Prevention Program is hereby adopted.
