

Work Begins on Veterans Pavilion



Construction has recently started on a Veterans Memorial Pavilion at the south end of Kirkpatrick Memorial Park. When finished, the project will include an amphitheater and five stations honoring five branches of the military. The project has been made possible by many generous donations and fundraising work by the Veterans Memorial Steering Committee and the Lexington Community Foundation. The goal is to have the project completed in time for a grand opening on Memorial Day weekend 2023.







Gift of Trees Partnership







In honor of 50 years of Nebraska Natural Resource Districts (NRDs) and Arbor Day's 150th anniversary, the Central Platte NRD and the Nebraska City Tourism and Commerce are partnering to gift a tree to counties throughout the District. As part of this Gift of Trees Program, the NRD and partners will plant the following five trees on Friday, October 21:

Dawson County: Sterling Linden at Lexington

City Hall (southwest side)

Buffalo County: Bur Oak at Cottonmill Park

in Kearney

Hall County: Matador Maples at Stolley

Park, and the CPNRD Office

in Grand Island

Merrick County: Bur Oak at Merrick County

Courthouse in Central City

At each tree planting, representatives from the Nebraska City Tourism, Grimm Gardens, and Central Platte NRD will present a history of Arbor Day, the benefits of planting trees, tree maintenance tips and the importance of the NRD system and its history. Members of Lexington's Tree Board will also be on hand.

EnergyWise Tip: In Hot Water

Getting into hot water can cost you a lot of money. Parents of some teenagers would definitely agree.

No, I'm not referring to attorney fees, fines and increased insurance premiums that might be associated with some roque or wayward youths. I'm talking about those parents with additional water heating costs due to an adolescent who "camps out" in the shower until the water heater yields "lukewarm" at best. To make matters worse, these kids often beat others in the household to the first shower.

One approach to addressing this problem might be to enroll the young "merman" or "mermaid" in some type of remedial hygiene course. Unfortu-nately, this tactic doesn't begin to address the financial impact of relying on a conventional water heater to meet home water heating needs. This is especially true for parents who secretly

indulge in prolonged hot showers themselves. In these situations, a heat pump water heater (HPWH) should definitely be considered.

Don't feel your home fits this profile? Here are a few other

- Unlike natural gas and propane water heaters that burn fuel inside your home and require venting, HPWHs use electricity and no venting is needed. Accordingly, selecting all-electric over combustion-based appliances reduces reliance on carbon monoxide detectors.



- In hybrid mode, HPWHs heat water faster than standard electric hot water heaters.
- By leveraging the efficiency of heat pump technology, carbon emissions are reduced by up to 75%.

According to ENERGY STAR[®], the average family of four saves approximately \$350 per year on their electric bills when using a HPWH compared to a standard water heater. Furthermore, if all U.S.purchased residential electric water heaters under 55 gallons were ENERGY STAR® -certified HPWHs, the energy cost savings would be almost \$12 billion a year. In addition, annual greenhouse gas emissions would be reduced by 140 billion pounds, which is equivalent to emissions from more than 13 million vehicles. Purple Lights Mystery



The City is not installing purple street lights, however, some existing street lights have turned purple. It turns out this is happening nationwide, with lights supplied by multiple vendors.

According to Nebraska Public Power District's Cory Fuehrer, the luminaires employ red, green and blue light-producing elements, and the green components may be losing power over time. "When properly blended, the chips will produce white-appearing light. Cut back on the green output and you get purple."

The manufacturer of Lexington's lights will replace the defective lights, and the City will install units when the new ones are received.


