


Polk Street Lift Station Relocation Starting



A new sanitary sewer lift station has been installed 625' east of Polk Street.

Work will start on March 27, 2025, to rehab the existing lift station to a manhole and install a new gravity flow sewer line from Polk Street east to the new lift station. The first 200' of line will be directional bored to avoid damage to lawns. Dewatering will be required to aid underground construction. Polk Street will be closed for 30 days between 20th Street and Apache Drive, with driveway access maintained to homes in proximity to the project area.

Residents on Apache Drive and 20th Street (between Polk Street and Hoover Street) will be provided rollout garbage totes during construction as the alley will be closed to garbage trucks.

EnergyWise Tip: Smart Homes

Could your home have an Intelligence Quotient (IQ)? While IQ tests are designed to assess human intelligence and not inanimate objects, people are seeking ways for their home to make autonomous, logical decisions and take independent actions to improve security and efficiency. That's a "Smart Home!"

What makes it smart? By connecting appliances and devices that can be controlled automatically or remotely through an internet connection and using a mobile or other networked device, a smart home can save energy with little to no effort on your behalf. Through one home automation system, door locks, doorbells, cameras, thermostats, lights and appliances interconnect to improve your home's overall security and efficiency.

If optimizing energy efficiency is a primary goal, integrating a smart meter or home energy monitor is a must. The energy you are consuming and where it's being used is nearly immediately available using a smart phone, note pad or computer. In doing so, you can start by targeting those items used the most to determine if there are improvements that can be made to reduce usage. To achieve energy savings, some connected items might include:



Smart Thermostats

Smart thermostats allow heating and cooling systems to operate more efficiently by automatically adjusting the temperature when you are out of the house or sleeping. According to the Center for Energy and Environment, smart thermostats are often the easiest way to achieve savings, often reducing your energy by 15% to 20%.

Lighting

Groups or individual light fixtures or bulbs can remotely be switched on and off, placed on a schedule, or set to change based on sunrise or sunset times. Smart lighting can often be set to change based on when motion is detected.

Smart Appliances

Smart appliances such as refrigerators, ovens,

dishwashers, washing machines, coffee makers, automatic vacuums, microwaves and televisions including entertainment systems can be integrated and controlled through one system. As more-and more utilities offer time-ofuse rate options, smart home systems can use smart appliance operations to optimize rate savings.

Outdoor Watering

Smart irrigation systems can detect climate and environmental conditions, factor in weather forecasts and incorporate the data into watering schedules. Smart irrigation systems enable homeowners to



Electric lawnmower technology has improved. Now if you buy a new electric lawnmower, get a rebate of about 20% the purchase cost. Also electric chainsaws, edgers, tillers leaf blowers, pruners and snowblowers.

is not your grandfather's battery-powered mower. Advances in battery technology have come a long way in recent years. More power is now being packed into batteries so your mower can speedily deliver a knock-out punch to your lawn.

Maybe it is time to consider upgrading your conventional, gas-burning mower with a new electric or battery-powered option. Consider the following advantages:

- Lower energy costs depending on how often you mow, electricpowered mowers will cost about \$15 per year in electricity. Gas mowers use approximately \$30 of gasoline.
- Less maintenance no sparkplugs, air filters, fuel filters, or oil change.
- Quieter operation electric mowers create up to 75 decibels of sound, which is similar to a washing machine. Gasoline mowers can exceed 95 decibels, which is comparable to a motorcycle on the highway.
- Eco-friendly no toxic gas emissions from nitrogen oxides, airborne particulates, carbon monoxide, or carbon dioxide.

Follow these easy steps

- Obtain an EnergyWiseSM Lawn and Garden Program application form from Lexington Utilities System (also at www.cityoflex.com under "Utilities" tab, scroll to bottom of page).
- Purchase your choice of a new (not used, previously owned or factory reconditioned) battery-powered or corded electric riding, walkbehind, or robotic mower on or after January 1, 2025. Chargers and additional battery purchases are available for the incentive at time of initial mower purchase. However, taxes, delivery/shipping and set-up costs are not.
- Complete the application and return it to Lexington Utilities System with a copy of proof of purchase identifying the selected mower, batteries, etc.
- Rebate also applies to electric chainsaws, tillers, edgers, leaf blowers, pruners and snowblowers.


Calling all puzzlers! Join in the fun on Saturday, April 5, for the





The Arbor Day Foundation has named Lexington a Tree City USA City community for the 28th year in a row. The designation recognizes

Lexington's commitment to nurturing a diverse urban forest in 2024. Lexington was also honored with a "Growth Award," for the Lexington Tree Board's 2024 tree planting projects, Arbor Day events, and continuing education.

Arbor Day 2025 is April 25. The Lexington Tree Board recommends the following trees to be good fits for Lexington's needs, climate, and soils: Mountain Ash, Coffeetree, Gingko (male only!), Hackberry, American Linden, Elm (Princeton, Discovery, Accolade, Frontier, Triumph, Japanese, Jefferson, New Horizons or Lacebark), Maple (Norway, Sugar or Miyabe), Orange Osage, Goldenraintree, Honeylocust

(Shademaster), Linden (American or Littleleaf), Oak (Bur or Chinkapin), Japanese Pagodatree, and Walnut.

Remember, you can save water



Save Water

Did you know that each of us uses 77 gallons of water a day?

When we over-water our lawns, the excess water carries pollution into storm drains and ditches that lead directly to our lakes and rivers.

So what can you do? Simple:

- Treat water as a valued resource. Water when necessary, instead of on a fixed schedule.
- Adjust your sprinklers to water only your lawn and plants not your driveway, sidewalk or street.
- Use mulch around trees and plants to help retain water, reduce weeds, and minimize the need for pesticides.
- Use rainwater to water your plants by directing downspouts toward your plants, or by collecting water with rain barrels.
- Make your lawn cheaper and easier to maintain by mowing high — three inches is the rule. Longer grass has deeper roots and requires less water.

Now that "tornado season" is here, Emergency Management Warning Sirens will sound to alert residents of an impending tornado in our area.

TORNADO NATURAL DISASTER TECHNICAL HAZARD

3 MINUTE STEADY SIGNAL

This signal indicates that a tornado, natural disaster, or technical hazard is pending. Persons should take cover or move to a place of safety and listen to a local radio or television station for information and further instructions. This siren may sound more than once if deemed necessary by Emergency Management.

Do not call the police or radio station to ask for information. People SIGHTING a tornado or funnel in this are urged to notify the Dawson County Emergency Center at 911.

ALL-CLEAR

The all-clear bulletin will be issued by the local radio and TV stations in cooperation with the National Weather Service.

Local Emergency Management <u>WILL NOT</u> issue an all-clear statement.

During unusual threatening weather or emergency conditions, listen to a local radio or TV station for further information.

SAFETY GUIDELINES The following are general safety guidelines for seeking shelter:

- Move to a lower level or basement
- If no lower level is available, move to an interior room or hallway on the lowest floor and get under a sturdy piece of furniture. Put as many walls as possible between you and the outside.
 - Stay away from windows.
- Flying debris from tornadoes causes most deaths and injuries.
 Cover your head and make yourself the smallest target possible.
- Do not try to outrun a tornado in your car; instead, get out of the vehicle and seek safe shelter in a nearby building.

 If you are outside and there is no shelter immediately available, avoid trees and vehicles. Do not get under an overpass or bridge. You are safe in a low, flat location. Lie flat in a nearby ditch or depression and cover your head with your hands.



Emergency warning system tests of one minute in duration are conducted the first Thursday of each month at 9:00 a.m. Sirens are designed for outdoors warning only. For optimal safety, citizens are encouraged to get weather radios using the NOAA (National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration) and/or SAME (Specific Area Message Encoding) standards.
